Overview of the Project Outcomes

In this project, Marjan Markovikj, the principal investigator, studied the evolution of the Macedonian language in its dialects and standard variety. This included an analysis of periphrastic constructions in Krste Misirkov's idiolect. These findings were presented and later published in the collection of essays "Krste Misirkov and the Macedonian Language." Davor Jankuloski empirically demonstrated, based on his research in dialects and the standard variety of Macedonian, that the description of periphrastic constructions in early Koneski's normative grammar of Macedonian is not entirely accurate. Specifically, the periphrastic construction with the auxiliary ima "to have" does not always denote the resultative meaning. This groundbreaking discovery is of immense significance in the fields of Macedonian and Balkan linguistics, a topic that Jankuloski discussed in depth during his lecture at SRC on October 10, 2024. Additionally, Jankuloski delivered two other lectures on Macedonian Linguistic Atlas (SRC) and Cultural Influence in Lexicon (U. of Tokyo). Motoki Nomachi, following Victor Friedman's advice and using the materials provided by him, worked on the grammatical specifics in the Aegean dialects of Macedonian. During Jankuloski's stay in Sapporo, Nomachi exchanged ideas with him on this topic. As a result of these discussions, a new project on Aegean Macedonian was agreed upon for future collaboration.
